"Too Much Sun Can Cause Skin Cancer, But This Woman Was Cured Without Surgery"

A news feature with the above headline ran in more than 2,500 newspapers nationwide last August, highlighting the story of Cheryl Cayford, a Seattle-area resident who had been diagnosed with skin cancer twice before and successfully treated with Mohs surgery. When she was diagnosed a third time, she remembered the pain and scarring of her prior surgeries and instead opted for a new treatment, which has proven just as successful as Mohs – nonsurgical Image-Guided Superficial Radiation Therapy, also known as IGSRT or The GentleCure ExperienceTM. The treatment involves low-level x-rays precisely targeted with the aid of high-resolution

ultrasound imaging and usually involves multiple 15-minute treatment sessions over roughly six weeks. "I was in and out in minutes," she said, "and during each visit my provider showed me ultrasound images of the cancer cells shrinking away. Today, I'm cancer-free with no visible signs of having had any medical procedure at all."

First-in-State Offerings of IGSRT: Waterville, Maine and Reno, Nevada

Governor Janet Mills sending congratulatory letters. Representative Madigan underscored that IGSRT is "research driven", and she thanked Dr. Hurdle for bringing it to Waterville. Elaine Lister, a patient, spoke about why she chose IGSRT and two TV stations, WABI 5/CBS and ABC 7/FOX 22, covered the event.

On January 16, Dr. Dr. Billie Casse of Reno Tahoe Dermatology in Nevada hosted an introductory event. Reno City Councilmember Brandi Anderson and Molly Rose Lewis, Northern Nevada Community Manager for U.S. Senator Jacky Rosen, spoke and a GentleCure patient, Lawrence Cross, shared insights into his successful treatment. Awareness of this new technology continues to capture the attention of public officials, as Lexington, Kentucky, Mayor Linda Gorton proclaimed the week of September 23, 2024, "Nonmelanoma Skin Cancer Awareness Week."



Her proclamation noted, "Individuals with nonmelanoma skin cancer should be informed by their physicians and healthcare providers about all available treatment options," citing IGSRT as a treatment option. The proclamation also recognized SkinMD of Lexington as the first medical practice in Fayette County to offer the treatment.
